

1. Walk to Glyncorrwg:

To organise a walk from St Mary's church to Glyncorrwg church on the path Ffordd y Ffeiriad (The way of the Priest) to commemorate all the people from the village who had to travel from the Blaengwrach to Glyncorrwg to attend religious services there in the 17 c.

Latest Timeline Article:


The last article to be included into the Gwrachtimeline website, was a letter which held the memories of William J. Benjamin about his time living, along with his parents, on the banks of Cnel Bach, a branch of the Neath Canal by Maes Gwyn.

In 1989 the "Missing Link" road was about to be made, running from the end of the dual carriageway at Aberdulias to join the dual carriageway at Glynneath. This meant that Cnel Bch would have to be built over and lost to time.

Mr Benjamin was so concerned that he wrote a letter to Neath Borough Council on the 26th December 1989 letting them know of his memories of living there, so that they would not be lost.


By the time he was living there the Neath canal was coming to the end of it's life and the little branch of the canal (Cnel Bach) had probably finished many years earlier on the arrival of the Vale of Neath railway.

He also mentioned that the house he lived in, shown below, that his parents told him was once a Public House.



Cnel Bach info:

The short branch canal Cnel Bach was built in 1817 to connect the Neath canal with the termination of the Blaengwrach tramroad. which crossed the river adjacent to the branch canal

Did you know? The escarpment on Craig y Llyn, above Llyn Fawr and Llyn Fach, was known as Talcen y Byd, in English Forehead of the World.

A series of articles by the Rev. John Griffiths in the Rhondda Leader in 1906 explains the history of Talcen y Byd. In the articles he mentions a few places associated with King Arthur, He mentions "Fennaun Arthur" or Arthurs well, a boundary point between Llyn Fawr and Rhondda Fawr, and at Blaengwrach farm

"That is not all. My **Blaengwrach** informant says that a place by **Blaengwrach Farm** is called **Plas Arthur**, and sometimes **Stafell Arthur**, where there is a stone on which "Arthur Sant" used to preach".

B. L. Coombes lived in the village for a short time. He originally came from Hereford, moved to Treharris for a short time, then to Resolven where he married a local girl and lived in number 10 New Inn Place. From there he moved to the small gatekeepers house by the old Rheola Aluminium works.

In 1941 he moved again, this time to live at Ynys-gron farm a little further up the valley from Tal William's bungalow. From there in 1944, he moved for the last time to Nantyfedwen Farm, Onllwyn.

He was a prestigious writer with his most famous book being "These Poor Hands" which is an autobiography of a miner working in South Wales. You will recognise a lot of places he talks about in his books and short stories. He also contributed a weekly column in the Neath Guardian for over 25 years, with an estimated 10,600,000 words written.
